This understanding is a function that cannot be assumed by anyone but you, dear fellow citizens. It is an understanding that all of the innocent victims of 50 years of occupation demand of us: such crimes must never be allowed to happen again. This will guarantee that Estonia indeed lasts through the ages.
